Part 1:

What Do We Do with the Bible?

Editor's Note:

Rev. Sandy is offering a three part series with excerpts from Richard Rhor's daily blog.

"Blessed Lord, who caused all holy Scriptures to be written for our learning: Grant us so to hear them, read, mark, learn and inwardly digest them, that we may embrace and ever hold fast the blessed hope of everlasting life, which you have given us in our Savior Jesus Christ; who

lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. Amen." - Collect for the Day #28, p. 236 BCP

As Episcopalians we hold that all things necessary for salvation are contained in the Holy Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments. We share that faith perspective with other Christian denominations throughout the world. As Episcopalians we also hold that God's self revelation must not be limited to any one particular document, text, translation, interpretation, or denominational bias. God's gifted, necessary and sufficient revelation knows no boundaries, and we may behold the glory of God as it also speaks and peaks through nature, art, music, literature, cuisine, sport, crafts, gardening, etc. Nothing is void of God's mysterious yet ever present and powerfully creative presence.

This and the next two newsletter editions will contain articles written by Fr. Richard Rhor on the possibilities and power inherent in engaging Holy Scripture in an open and welcoming way. In conversation with human reason, tradition, and shared experience, we have much to learn in our small STORY groups. Certainly there is a plethora of accessible information at the literal level of any story, but our faith testimonies (stories, psalms, fables, parables, letters, genealogies, proverbs, theophanies, epistles, dreams, prophesies, myths, etc.) as multivalent texts, invite participation and encounter at ever deeper and deeper levels of knowledge. experience, emotion, and meaning. Delving the depths of the Bible is a life long journey. Each time we open to the Word of God we are in a position to uncover and/or discover something new. This can be unsettling at times (challenging our preconceived notions) and also salvific (healing), in that encounters with the Holy One invite transformation and growth. There is no "end" to God's depth of love for us, nor end to God's desire to reveal more and more of that love with every visitation. I pray that these essays will help all of us recognize the richness and power of the STORY and each of its 31 chapters. With consent, our faith-filled small group studies (along with our private reflections) may bring us into ever deeper and deeper levels of intimacy and union with the person of Jesus, the Christ of our faith who is the source of the Holy Bible and whose presence permeates all.

What Do We Do with the Bible?

For all its inspiration, for all the lives it has changed, the Bible is undeniably problem atic. Put in the hands of egocentric, unloving, or power-hungry people or those who have never learned how to read spiritually inspired literature, it is almost always a disaster. History has demonstrated this, century after century, so this is not an unwarranted, disrespectful, or biased conclusion. The burning of heretics, the Crusades, slavery, apartheid, hom ophobia, and the genocide and oppression of native peoples were all justified through the selective use of Scripture quotes.

So, what are we supposed to do with the Bible? We'll unpack what Jesus did with the Hebrew Scriptures-the only Bible he knew.

My general approach is to change the seer and not to change the text. Only transformed people can be entrusted with inspired writings. They can operate in a symbiotic ("shared life") relationship with words and are unlikely to use the Bible to exclude and shame others or as a rationale for their bad behavior.

The Christian's goal is to be transformed by the renewing of our mind into the mind of Christ (see Romans 12:2; 1 Corinthians 2:16; and Philippians 2:5). That is why I try to read the Bible the way Jesus did, following Jesus' hermeneutic (a method of interpreting sacred texts). Just as we are trying to do with this year's Daily Meditations, Jesus was a master of winnowing the chaff from the grain (see Matthew 3:12 and Luke 3:17) and "bringing out of the storeroom new treasures as well as old" (Matthew 13:52).

The Bible is an anthology of many books. It is a record of people's experiences of God's self-revelation. It is an account of our very human experience of the divine intrusion into history. The book did not fall from heaven in a pretty package. It was written by people trying to listen to God. I believe that the Spirit was guiding the listening and writing process. We must also know that humans always see "through a glass darkly...and all knowledge is imperfect" (1 Corinthians 13:12). Prayer and patience surrounding such human words will keep us humble and searching for the true Living Word, the person of Jesus, which is how the Spirit best teaches (1 Corinthians 2:10, 13)-through living exemplars. This is surely what it means to know "contemplatively."

When history finally gets to the Risen Jesus, there is nothing to be afraid of in God. Jesus' very breath is identified with forgiveness and the divine *Shalom* (see John 20:20-23). If the Risen Jesus is the full and trustworthy unveiling of the nature of God, then we live in a safe and love-filled universe. It is not that God has changed, or that the Hebrew God is a different God than the God of Jesus; it is that we are growing up as we move through the text and deepen our experience. Stay with the Bible and with your inner life with God and your capacity for God will increase.

Just as the Bible takes us through many stages of consciousness and history, it takes us individually a long time to move bey ond our need to be dualistic, judgmental, accusatory, fearful, blaming, egocentric, and earning--and to see as Jesus sees. The Bible itself is a "text in travail," according to Rene Girard's fine insight. It mirrors and charts our own human travail. It offers both mature and immature responses to almost everything. In time, you will almost naturally recognize the difference between the text moving forward toward the mercy, humility, and inclusivity of Jesus and when the text is regressing into arrogance, exclusion, and legalism.

We are pleased with the participation in our Stewardship campaign for this year and

We very much appreciate all of our members who provide their time, money, talents, and inspiration to all of the activities throughout the year at St. Stephen's Episcopal Church and School. We are in the process of planning our 2019 budget based upon pledges.

PROPERTY IMPROVEMENTS

Here is a summary of some of the accomplishments we have recently made on our property. All of these are very important to our facilities and grounds. We have completed major repairs. We are grateful to our Vestry Facilities Committee members: David Reynolds, Andrew Wallendorf, and Ann Robertson. With their supervision, we have completed the following:

- the courtyard porch roof with a metal roof that provides its longevity
- fascia to better support the bottom row of tiles
- posts with new paint to both weatherize and add beauty to the walkways
- staining the Log Cabin where our children meet for Sunday School, giving it a
 welcoming fresh coat of paint on the porch for all to enjoy
- repairing church window sashes to securely hold the glass
- installing handicap bars in all bathrooms for the safety and comfort of all
- making our buildings more accessible by adding a handicap entrance into McArthur Hall to make it easier to come inside for all our fellowship gatherings and ministerial meetings.

EP PERMIT CASE

St. Stephen's Episcopal Church and School have joined with Hays County, TESPA, and other nearby landowners to contest the EP groundwater permit from the Barton Springs Edwards Aquifer Conservation District. We participated in the first meeting with protesting parties on the EP groundwater permit on January 9, 2019 at the State Office of Administrative Hearings, SOAH. Judges Howard Seitzman and Rebecca Smith will be mediators for all subsequent sessions. Following mediation, SOAH Judge Summerhays scheduled the hearing for September 19-27, 2019. More information will be provided as this case proceeds.
